<a href="#">Curricular Integration</a>	A series of strategies used to connect the content of one or more academic and CTE courses so that what is learned in one discipline is combined with...
<a href="#">Differentiated Instruction</a>	An instructional approach in which the teacher adapts the content, process, and product of lessons to match each student's readiness, learning style,...
<a href="#">Digraph</a>	A digraph is a group of two letters that express one sound. An example is sh...
<a href="#">Direct-Interactive Teaching Model</a>	A direct teaching approach that typically follows a cycle that includes: checking previous work, presenting new material, student practice with new material,...
<a href="#">Distance Education / Learning</a>	A delivery mechanism which utilizes various technologies to provide educational opportunities to students who are not physically "on site" in a traditional...
<a href="#">Dual Enrollment</a>	A strategy whereby high school or adult education students enroll in college courses while still enrolled in high school or adult school. Courses may...
<a href="#">Dual Reading</a>	A tutor and a learner read together. This gives the learner practice in fluency...
<a href="#">Echo Reading</a>	A tutor reads first and then the learner reads the same item...
<a href="#">Effective Practice</a>	Organizational, administrative, instructional, or support activities engaged in by programs that have been validated by research and literature sources...
<a href="#">Electronic Community of Practices (e-CoP)</a>	Electronic Community of Practice is an initiative of the California Adult Literacy Professional Development Project (CALPRO). The mission of e-CoP is...
<a href="#">English as a Second Language (ESL)</a>	Adult education for adults whose inability to understand, speak, read, or write the English language constitutes a substantial impairment of their ability...
<a href="#">ESL-Citizenship (ESL-Cit)</a>	ESL-Citizenship is one component of a federally funded EL Civics program. ESL-Cit connects language and literacy to the lives of learners, prepares them...
<a href="#">Evidence-Based Reading Instruction</a>	A particular program or collection of instructional practices that has a tested and proven record of success. That is, there is reliable, trustworthy...
<a href="#">Experiential Education</a>	Education that stresses hands-on experience, via field trips, internships, or activity-oriented projects, in contrast to traditional classroom learning...
<a href="#">Experimental Research</a>	Experimental reading instruction research includes studies that (1) objectively compare groups of learners receiving different forms of reading instruction...
<a href="#">Facilitator</a>	A role for classroom teachers that allows students to take a more active role in learning. Teachers assist students in making connections between classroom...
<a href="#">Flipped Classroom</a>	The flipped classroom is a pedagogical model in which the typical lecture and homework elements of a course are reversed. The notion of a flipped classroom...
<a href="#">Fluency</a>	Fluency in reading is the ability to read with speed and ease. When readers are fluent, they read accurately, without making mistakes in pronunciation,...
<a href="#">Grapheme</a>	Letters or groups of letters in an alphabet used to represent the phonemes (basic sounds) in a language...
<a href="#">Guided Oral Reading</a>	An instructional technique where students read text aloud and an instructor or helper (such as a peer tutor) provides feedback on the students reading...

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
